**IMPH ALUMNI EAST AFRICA REGIONAL MEETING
KAMPALA, UGANDA * 10-12 FEBRUARY 2014
HEALTH SYSTEMS IN GLOBAL AND LOCAL CONTEXTS**

With the 2015 end-date for the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) in sight, communities at national and regional levels have been asked to contribute to a global conversation on sustainability, led by the United Nations and its specialized agencies. Meetings with health professionals at country and regional level are being held in many countries of the world through 2014-2015 to address the challenge of sustainability for those MDG goals attained by 2015 and to examine strategies to ensure continued progress toward successful attainment of health targets. The Pears Foundation East Africa Alumni Regional Meeting was co-hosted with the Makerere University School of Public Health, one of the leading Schools of Public Health in sub-Saharan Africa. Twenty-seven IMPH alumni from Ethiopia, South Sudan, Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda and seven non-alumni invited Health Systems experts met to explore the timely and pertinent theme of "Health Systems in Global and Local Contexts". Meetings with health professionals at country and regional level are being held in many countries of the world through 2014-2015 to address the challenge of sustainability for those MDG goals attained by 2015 and to examine strategies to ensure continued progress toward successful completion of health targets. This meeting provided an opportunity for the following IMPH alumni, working in and on health systems, to present their experience at the local, national, regional and global levels:

Dr. Josephine Ojiambo, in her position as Chief of the Executive Board and External Relations Branch at the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), delivered an impassioned introduction to the meeting challenging our alumni to be 'the new Africans' leading public health agendas; to engage in the murky world of policy as each was directed to "pick your fight", and not to be afraid to challenge! Josephine's words echoed throughout the meeting in comments and discussions among participants.

Our invited speakers were drawn from experts working in or on all levels of health systems organizations, from the local NGOs to national Ministries of Health. Their presentations provided the evidence required to explore and compare health systems at the regional level noting challenges met and challenges that remain.

Rwanda is considered to have developed the most efficient and interesting health systems model for the country. Dr. Parfait Uwaliraye, Ministry of Health, outlined the model's framework and its delivery that have led Rwanda to be a model for health systems and health care delivery in sub-Saharan Africa. As one alumnus from Ethiopia noted, although he had attended many conferences off the continent, this was the first time he had visited another African country and there was much to share. His country's (Ethiopia) programs, presented by Dr. Mieraf Tadesse and Dr. Elias Yesuf, and those of Rwanda were explored for their complementary strengths and challenges. This meeting provided the opportunity for our alumni to learn from each other as public health practitioners. In addition, the broad regional focus facilitated interaction and engagement. Following the evaluations and recommendations from the IMPH Alumni 2013 Conference, the Kampala meeting was designed to provide ample time for informal discussions and networking among our alumni and between our alumni and our invited speakers. Every break found the participants in small groups – building new friendships and renewing others – actively engaging with the topic at hand and their own experiences working 'on the ground'.

The Pears-funded Alumni initiatives for mentorship, the next round of 'Seed Grant' program funding and the launch of a new social networking platform were presented during the second meeting day. The IMPH team has elected to work with the Israeli start-up platform – alum.ni – on a one-year trial basis (a free platform) to facilitate interaction among our alumni and provide a protected, common space for sharing of personal information, career opportunities in research and practice, and to make available IMPH alumni program materials.

Mentorship Program materials which outline our expectations for Mentors and Mentees, were presented at the meeting and will be available on the alum.ni platform to be launched by April 2014. We informed the meeting of the next round of Seed Grant project proposals/funding opportunities which will be formally announced to all alumni in mid-March. Two of the currently-funded four Seed Grant project recipients presented their progress and results to date in formal presentations to meeting participants.


We were very pleased to co-host this meeting with the Makerere University School of Public Health. Our alumnus, Dr. Peter Waiswa, facilitated the connections with MUSPH Dean Prof. W. Bazeyo, their administrative secretary (Mrs. Josephine Adikini) and selected speakers. Makerere University is one of the oldest public universities in sub-Saharan Africa and stands out for its excellence in both research and teaching. The MUSPH was very pleased to have the Braun School IMPH program as their co-hosts. Our visit to the School reinforced our appreciation for the contributions that Makerere University has made to the teaching and training of health professionals over the past 65 years. Prof. Bazeyo will likely be visiting Israel later this year and we look forward to his visit to the Braun School.

We are currently exploring options for the most appropriate institutional host for the West Africa meeting to be held late November-early December 2014 in either Ghana or Cameroon.

For those alumni who were unable to attend this regional meeting and all IMPH alumni from other parts of the world, the entire meeting – presentations, discussions - including the incredibly enjoyable cultural evening at the Ndere Centre, Kampala, were audio-visually recorded. These recordings will be available on the IMPH website.

We look forward to the 2014 meeting in the West Africa region!

Revisiting Malaria: Moving from Control to Sustainable Elimination 8-12 December 2013, Hebrew University-Hadassah, Jerusalem

It has been 90 years since **Dr. Israel Kligler** first outlined a visionary malaria control and elimination program for Mandate Palestine. Having arrived from the Rockefeller Institute in 1921, Dr. Kligler embarked upon pioneering epidemiological research studies and joined Hebrew University in 1925. In that same year, the prestigious League of Nations Malaria Commission (including two of the most influential malariologists of the period - NH Swellengrebel and SP James) toured Mandate Palestine. Kligler convincingly demonstrated that within a short time his integrated model would eliminate malaria from Mandate Palestine. Indeed, the visionary work of Dr. Israel Kligler during the Mandate Palestine period was one of the most outstanding success stories of malaria control and elimination in the 20th century.

Despite many successes over the past 100 years, malaria continues to inflict a major toll on developing regions of the world, where, of the reported 660,000 annual malaria deaths globally, an estimated 90% of malaria deaths occur in sub-Saharan Africa each year. The Braun School together with the Kuvim Centre of Hebrew University-Hadassah hosted a five-day conference, drawing upon lessons learned in malaria control and eradication, bringing Kligler's work back to the forefront of the malaria control and elimination discussion. The group of 20 international experts came to Jerusalem to revisit the strategies deployed successfully for malaria (vector) elimination in Mandate Palestine. The conference also highlighted success stories from other parts of the world. Identification of prerequisites for successful elimination, augmented with recent technological advances, have paved the way for the development of novel strategies for permanent and sustainable malaria elimination.

The conference included presentations from invited participants from sub-Saharan Africa, Europe and North America, and local Israeli experts who engaged in small group work, brainstorming sessions, and plenary feedback presentations. Conference participants developed a practical malaria elimination program for one specific East African epidemiologic malaria zone and recommendations that could lay the foundation for another in West Africa. In addition, a conference proceedings report is expected to be published and distributed internationally. This timely conference provided an opportunity to explore the development of scientific research and field experience over the past 120 years and the relevance to contemporary malaria challenges. The conference honoured the pioneering scientists, especially Kligler, and their contributions to malaria control, eradication and elimination that continue to stimulate and inform the malariology world.
