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A Note from Prof. Yehuda Neumark— IMPH Director


One study cited 5 benefits of returning to an old job:

The conference is a great opportunity, by the way, for meeting, so please let us know if you are planning on attending and we can organize a mini-reunion.

Speaking of which, as you know from the previous newsletter, Prof. Adesegun Fatusi, Provost of the College of Health Sciences of Obafemi Awolowo University in Nigeria, hosted a wonderfully successful West Africa regional alumni reunion in February. The meeting was attended by twenty-two IMPH alumni from Cameroon, Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana, Mali, Senegal and Nigeria (including two senior alumni from 1973 and 1998), Ora, Maureen and me, together with invited non-alumni health-systems experts to explore the timely and pertinent theme of "Health Systems: Transition-ing from Infectious Diseases to Non-Communicable Diseases".

As many of you know, we are planning an IMPH Alumni re-union for next year. We were hoping to have the event in February 2017, but this has been postponed. We are looking at a number of possibilities including possibly holding it in conjunction with the graduation ceremony of the 2016-2017 class in September 2017. We appreciate that you need to plan months in advance, and will update you as soon as we have further details. Stay tuned.

The 2nd semester has come to a close and we look forward to the graduation ceremony of the current IMPH class on September 14th. We eagerly look forward to welcoming back to her alma mater Mrs. Narmada Acharya (IMPH 1998) who will present this year's keynote address. You are all invited to attend and I am delighted that some of her former IMPH classmates are thinking of joining us.

Health Ministry Targets 95% Coverage For Maternal and Child Health Week

The Ministry of Health and Sanitation [in Sierra Leone] and its partners are targeting 95% Coverage for the first phase of Maternal and Child Health Week.

Speaking to journalists on recently at the Ministry's conference room, Deputy Programme Manager **Dr. Mariama Murray** [Sierra Leone, IMPH 2014/2015] said as part of the country's efforts to prevent vaccine preventable diseases, maintain polio eradication and achieve measles elimination, three rounds of nationwide supplementary immunization activates (SIAs) have been conducted.

She said the Ebola outbreak has affected service delivery of many programs; each round of the SIA was integrated with other health interventions. "The June MCH week will be conducted on June 23-27, 2016. During this round, vitamin



A capsules, deworming tablets, defaulter tracing and vaccination of children 0 to 23 months, and focused ANC services for pregnant women will be delivered," she said.

She went on to say that the Ministry of Health and Sanitation and partners are using this campaign as another platform to provide essential health services and to regain public confidence in the health system. According to her, their goal is for MCHW to increase the coverage for various lifesaving interventions that impact on the welfare of women and children thereby reducing mortality and morbidity. And their main objective is to achieve at least 95% coverage for specific interventions. More than 1.5 million under—five children are being targeted for the campaign. Dr. Murray disclosed that 11, 502 workers were recruited, independent monitors, national supervisors, nurses, among others. She appealed to the people of Sierra Leone "The health workers are well trained, please open your doors for them to give the service to your children and when you open the door you will be educated on several health related issues for the wellbeing of the child".




